Overseas Project

As you are aware, our Overseas Project this year is the Peace and Reconciliation Workshop with wives of South Sudanese bishops, which is a continuation of work begun by Caroline Welby through the "Women on the Front Line" project. It took place recently in Uganda, and was combined with MULO. Those present came from many different tribes and language groups, most of whom had never met, and the civil war in South Sudan had resulted in much suspicion between tribes. However, through the work of the workshop leaders, the prayers of many and the over-riding grace of God, by the end of the week they were singing and dancing together and barriers had been broken down.
