Dear MU friends and supporter,



Isn't this a great message for our Christian lives? Luckily we don't have a budget

for what it costs to renew and transform our lives – it is freely given to us. All the advice we need is in the Bible. We quite often need to repair and mend our ways and this can only come about by asking for forgiveness and help. We can then fertilise our souls and bodies by studying the Bible and then we can prune by identifying our faults and getting rid of the dead parts. We can work on trying to attract people to turn to Christ by what we do and say and we can prepare for eternal life with our Christ in glory.

Following the service Kylie Harrod, Project Officer, Newcastle Anglican's Domestic and Family Abuse Project spoke to us on what the Diocese is doing by making us aware of the signs of abuse and what we can do to assist with this growing problem in our communities. Thank you to the MU Branches who have invited me to visit (Cessnock, Belmont, Merewether, Boolaroo, Taree and Lambton) and some also asked me to present years of membership badges and certificates, celebrate in special birthdays of members, acknowledge anniversaries of their branches and to share time with members. It is a blessing to attend and especially to hear about what their Branches are doing. I am expanding my knowledge of the internet and now communicate with other Diocesan Presidents in our Province by ZOOM and recently connected to Mary Sumner House through MU Live. It did take a while for MSH to work out that we were Newcastle Diocese Australia not Newcastle Diocese UK. I do encourage you all who have internet access to login to the Australian MU and our Newcastle Diocese websites. The web address for MU Australia is www.muaustralia.org.au and for our Diocese www.munewcastle.org.au. Both sites are regularly updated and there are resources that can be used in Branch meetings.

What a wonderful celebration for the coronation of King Charles. It was a moving service and, as always, the English seem to be pretty good at organising and carrying out such events.

CHAPLAINS CHATTER Reverend Nicole Baldwin

Dear friends in Christ,

By the time you read this reflection, we will be in the Sundays after Pentecost. We will have been reminded at the end of Matthew's Gospel (28.16-20) that Jesus



said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.' And we will be living into this once again, pondering all that we are called to do, and perhaps wondering how we might carry out this Great Commission in a world that is indifferent or actively resistant to faith in God. Our response needs to be one of being the hands and feet, the ears and eyes, the arms and voice, of Jesus in the world. If we listen deeply, respond in obedience, and act with love, God will open the hearts of those he is calling us to minister to and be companions of.

As we seek renewal and transformation in our lives and in the life of the Church it is so important to remember that Jesus promises to be with us always. The Holy Spirit will teach us all that we need to know and will equip us for ministry. As we discern the gifts that we have been given, we are to use these for the building of God's kingdom in the places that we live and move and have our being.

The National Church Lifestyle Survey tells us that approximately 40% of people are open to an invitation to engage in faith-based activities. This is probably not coming to Church in the first instance, but there is a willingness in the communities that we live in to accept an invitation to be part of something the church is doing. So, when was the last time that you invited a friend to something your church is doing? Personal invitations convey a level of commitment that we do not get with general invitations.

Being personally invited can be very reassuring that the person being invited won't be left to fend for themselves, that they will have someone who can introduce them to the people that they do not know, and that they will have a companion at the event. Many of us enjoy doing things with our friends and sharing experiences, feeling included and welcomed is one of the steps to feeling a sense of belonging. What better way to welcome someone than to offer a personal invitation and to be a companion to the event!

Renewal and transformation also call us to take a stand against injustice, violence, and discrimination in all their forms. The things we walk past are the things that we accept. We might be surprised if we consider and reflect on this deeply. Mark Link wrote the following short but powerful reflection:

A woman saw a little girl in the street playing with filthy trash. The child was poorly dressed and ill-nourished. The woman became angry and said to God, 'Why do you let a thing like that happen in the world you created? Why don't you do something about it?'

God replied, 'I did do something about it. I created you.'

I invite you to ponder this deeply. God created each one of us in his image, you, me, the woman in this reflection, and the little girl. Remembering that we are the hands and feet, the eyes and ears, the arms and voice of Jesus in the world today, how will we respond to the needs of others that we see around us. When we ask 'Why?' how will we respond to God's answer, 'I did do something about it. I created you.'

May we do all we can to challenge the injustice, violence, and discrimination that we see, that the world may be transformed and renewed so that all people are treated with respect and dignity. We are all brothers and sisters. We are all entrusted with the precious gift of life.

What will you do with yours?

May the blessings of God give us courage for all that God calls us to.






The Mysterious Refinding of a Lambton Treasure.

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

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10 commitments for preventing and responding to domestic and family violence.

- 1. Our church acknowledges and laments the violence which has been suffered by some of our members and repents of the part we have played in allowing an environment where violence went unaddressed.
- 2. Our church leaders commit to ensure conditions that support the prevention of violence, a church culture that promotes equality and support for those who experience violence.
- 3. Our Church consistently teaches about equality, freedom from violence, respectful relationships and the honour/value of every person.
- 4. Our Church affirms that human relationships are to be based on respect and mutuality.
- 5. Our church acknowledges the different experiences of all people and that these have played a part in whether they have been treated with respect and equality.
- 6. Our Church actions are directed by the gospel of love, peace and justice, and are informed and engaged with local, state and national government initiatives as appropriate.
- 7. Our church supports cultural change in our communities by communicating effectively to our members.
- 8. Our church trains our leaders, pastoral staff and parish councils to understand and be equipped to respond in ways that prevent and address domestic and family violence.
- 9. Our leaders and pastoral staff hold themselves to account and are guided by the Anglian Church's Code of Conduct. Faithfulness in Service.
- 10. These commitments are regularly reviewed and improved.


