

Carrying Lenten disciplines into the year

Dear friends in Christ,

As I write this reflection, our journey through Lent, to the cross and the empty tomb has already begun. On Shrove Tuesday, many of us gathered with our families of faith to enjoy pancakes and prepare

ourselves for Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. We give things up that are not good for us and take up things that are good for us in Lent. Our Lenten intentions should help us to draw closer to God, to reflect on his presence in our lives, and to listen for his 'still small voice' guiding us. They are the changes that we need to make in our normal life so that our relationship with God can deepen and mature. On Ash Wednesday, we received ashes on our foreheads to remind us that we are dust and that we will return to dust. We are reminded to repent, to believe the Gospel, and to turn to Christ.

Often, once Lent is over and we have celebrated Christ's victory over the grave on Easter Sunday, the Lenten intentions that we have worked on keeping for the Season of Lent are put aside or forgotten. We take back up the things that we stopped doing for Lent, or we fall back into old ways and stop doing the new things we had begun.

I wonder what it might be like for us to continue our Lenten disciplines into the rest of the year, to carry them forward rather than putting them aside? If what we have chosen to stop doing or taken up draws us closer to God, would we not want to continue that intention and make it part of our new normal? Perhaps this is one way of continuing to grow

closer to God's heart. It might mean that next year, we will need to commit to something new, something that we have not done before, rather than revisit our usual Lenten disciplines.

In this way we could be changed, we could be transformed and renewed for Christ.



We live in a world where change is coming faster all the time. We are expected, in many ways to keep up, and to live in a new normal. Perhaps we feel as though there is no choice but to move with the times. There are some things that it is good to leave behind, and in the same way, there are many things that are important to take with us into the future. Our faith in Christ, the hope that we have in his promise to love us, to guide us, to walk with us, and to bring us safely to heaven, are foundations on which we build our lives and our ministries. As we transform our lives, our families, and our communities, by shining forth God's love into our broken and divided world, we 'let the same mind' be in us 'that was in Christ Jesus.' That's what being women of purpose is about for us.

Because we are women of purpose, because we are people of purpose, God calls us to do something that helps shine his love into the world. We all have gifts and talents, given to us by God. When we share these with others, we share God's love. We have many gifts to offer others including our hospitality and creativity, a listening ear and pastoral heart, a willingness to hear about the journey of others and share our own. When we are true to who we are in Christ, we are more readily able to recognise the gifts God gives us and the ways in which they can be offered in service of others.

There is a deep and abiding need to care for ourselves and our own relationship with God. When we do this, we can accompany others on their journey as companions and friends on the way. We are encouraged by our theme this year to be women of purpose and to 'do something' to let the same mind be in us that was in Christ Jesus. Perhaps offering our giftedness to others and nurturing our relationship with God in new and ongoing ways are some of the 'somethings' we can do?

Executive enjoyed a service of Holy Communion at St Luke's Millfield, followed by our meeting, and then a delightful lunch at The Central

Millfield. (Rev Nicole)

Let us be the ones who stand up and say that we want to do something, remembering that God created us for this time and place in his story.




Christian Care for Families—Dr Robyn Ray

(Australian President of MU Australia)

Dear fellow members of MU Australia

Welcome to another year of opportunities and fellowship as we seek to be both inwardly nurturing and outwardly focused active members of MU. I pray that 2024 will be a year of many blessings amidst few challenges as we seek through our MU work to be God's hands in today's world. This year brings



During our worship time this morning, we read from St Paul's letter to the Colossians Chapter 1. It so aptly described my thoughts about you all as we begin a new year of hope and rejuvenation.

...for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth the gospel...it has been bearing fruit among yourselves' (Col:3-6).

During my first year in the role of president I was able to visit several dioceses, listen to their stories and workshop ways forward that are possible and practical in each place. From these workshops three key words emerged:

- * Visibility
- * Articulation
- * Relevance

I propose that these three words be used to focus our endeavours to transform MU in 2024. These endeavours do not need to be major undertakings but rather (to quote your VP Parenting Elizabeth Parker), be 'one more good thing' to address each word.

Visibility

As recognised by your Executive last year, MU is largely invisible in our parishes and the community. During the year I discovered some examples where MU appeared in pew bulletins but with little recognition or relevance to the rest of notices. I visited one parish where they were having a celebration of the activities in that parish and although they have an active MU including diocesan office bearers, MU did not appear on any of the posters. I challenge you as I do myself to make sure MU is visible. At the conclusion of one workshop a member said: 'Oh so I can wear my MU shirt on other occasions that are not about MU'. What can you do in your context to increase the visibility of MU?

Articulation

While we participate in and support many projects, few people have any real idea of what MU does beyond having a monthly 'exclusive to MU service' with great morning tea. We need to share the MU message and the work of MU with others. May I suggest you spend a meeting this year developing short informative sentences that describe the real work of MU, thus inwardly nurturing your members with the skills to talk about MU. While fellowship is an important part of belonging to MU, it doesn't tell people much and can sound self-serving. Our Christian concern for families and the ways in which we achieve that will help us to tell a relevant and more engaging stories about MU. Who knows, your description and enthusiasm for MU may encourage others to become members.

Relevance

People in our parishes often see MU as irrelevant to the modern world. While we are expected to be 'in the world but not of the world' the work of MU will be more relevant if we use secular opportunities to put a faith perspective. For example, in the Lectionary for Anglican Church of Australia the fourth Sunday of Lent focuses on Refreshment Sunday setting aside a time when fasting can be relaxed for the day. Many MU branches still hold to this Sunday as Mothering Sunday despite Mothering Sunday being an old English tradition and the lack of connection with the Lenten liturgy. If MU was prepared to move the celebration of Mothering Sunday to Mothers' Day in May (Simmel cake, flowers etc), we could make an important impact on the wider congregation and align the day with an emphasis on mothers especially as May is Domestic and Family Violence Prevention month. We could also negotiate with the clergy to celebrate Fathers' Day in September, strengthening the importance of the fathering role.

There are other examples where MU can be more closely associated with activities in the community. As you consider opportunities to be more outwardly focused, please take some time this year to contemplate how your branch could make a small change in your activities to be more relevant.

I look forward to working with you all in this exciting year as we seek to live into the Objectives of MU in more dynamic ways, sharing our Christian faith through our work with families.

May God continue to bless all you do in his name through MU.



He asked the second man the same question and he said he was putting up a wall. When he got to the third man and asked him what he was doing he said he was building a cathedral.

They were all doing the same thing.

The first man had a job.

The second man had a career.

The third man had a calling.


I have a sign on wall near my computer that says:

BABY BUNDLE BAGS

At the moment we are unable to purchase these bags. A friend of a Merewether MU member was making them for me, sadly passed away last year. I have been making them myself, however last year I used 100 bags so I am wondering if there may be some ladies who could help out by making a few bags. MU can reimburse any costs. They can be made from calico or any cotton fabric. The size is 49 cm in height and 46cm in width. The pocket on the outside holds a small teddy or toy and a card so proxy 20cm square. The purchased ones have a 6 cm gusset. I made mine

without the gusset just using an envelope corner to form a gusset. Bags any smaller than this are just not big enough to hold all the items. I would be very grateful for any help with these bags which go to John Hunter Hospital, Aboriginal Maternal Health and now also Maitland Hospital.

the Lord require of you' (Micah 6.8) with the story of Ruth were inspirational. In order to keep costs down the AW executive members catered. Lorraine Phillips






